Horsing Around ...

"What a surprise, writes Mrs Lilian Kearne, (nee Speller of Red Lion Court, Eign Street, Hereford), "to pick up a copy of Age To Age in the library and there, staring at me on the front page was the gypsy family who worked with us when we worked on the timber during the war I was a member of the Women's Timber Corps.

"I wonder where they are now? They were indeed a fine and proud family hard working, spotlessly clean, the inside of their caravan an absolute picture of tidiness. Lovely! I recall working in the wood one day I thought would sit on one of their horses. What a width to straddle! One of the men nearby hit the animal across the rear end and the horse bolted with me hanging on for dear life. It eventually stopped and Ann (I believe that was the bride's name caught us up and helped me down, very shocked, she and I!"

Horsing about...

Burton's Bakery delivery vans in our last issue David Ayres recalls being employed by the bakery soon after leaving school. In his earlier days he was an assistant to the driver of a horse drawn van, delivering bread.

Later he became a driver's mate on the electric vans at 12/6d (about 62p a week. He recognised Walter Yemm and Mr Styles from the picture.

And our picture reminded Fred Jones (we hope we have read your name correctly) of how much horse transport there was in Hereford in 1936. "There was Fred Lewis and his horse van emblazoned India & China. Coal was all horse delivered. The brewery drays Arnold Perretts of the Cheltenham Original Brewery for example delivered to the pubs. Grooms Timber Yard used horses on their waggons with Bill Grundy in charge. The horses, Boxer and Trumper among them used to run free from their yard to the field at the bottom of College Hill which made the children scamper for cover

"There were two milk floats, Mr Jones' and Mr Newman's. Two vegetable carts, Mr Payne and Mr Young. There was the incredible occasion when Mr Young's horse bolted and yet managed to clear the small railway tunnel in Burcott Road without damaging the cart. Mr Blackwell still had his horse, Tommy and his trap in which privileged relatives on visits were usually given a trip via Holmer and Lyde but they walked up Holmer Pitch."

The Brickyard Scoop

The picture of the Boys of the Brickyard published in our March issue brought back two memories, one from distant Australia Visitors to Hereford from Australia took their copy of Age To Age home and showed it to relatives Barry and Lisa Thomas who instantly recognised the young boy sitting in the front. He was Barry's father Bill Thomas, now 75 and iving in Melbourne. The Good Old Days reproduced the original photograph which we have forwarded to them.

And when Hereford Lore editors Vi Thomas and Roy Kennett spoke to the Silver Threads Club at St Martins, they met May Symonds who identified her husband in the same photograph

May came to Hereford in 1939 and met Percy Symonds. They married in 1942 Percy died in 1982. May recognised Percy pictured long before she met him for his stance and "the jaunty angle of his cap" May says that although Percy was a market gardener when they were married he had told her that he worked at the brickyard in his youth Also n the picture was Percy's father Fred Symonds.
