Crocod les?" Extending hs arms he bellowed " shot one b. with jaws this big!" One of the teachers Miss Brook, used to cycle from Allensmore in al weathers She ater became headmistress When was 11. attended Lord Scudamore School We covered most subjects including housewifery lessons held in a building by the Town Hal and n which cooking was the favourite lesson Our sports field was by the Water Tower where we played hockey every two weeks and swimming was in Bath Street, n a building which is now the Masonic Lodge Boys from St Martins went to St John's School which was in the Cathedral Close at the back of the General Post Office as it was known then On the first day at school my brother and his friend Bi Godwin played footbal in the playground while waiting to go into assembly But they went n quicker than expected when the bal went through one of the windows!

ick Birch who died some years ago recalled starting at Lugwardine School in 1912 There were three teachers Miss Jones who we called Carroty because of her red hair Miss Macburnie in charge of the middle class and Mr Johnstone who had the upper class Most children started school at 5 and left at 12 I was only 4 when started At playtime the big boys played out n the road n the First World War we collected horse chestnuts for making explosives one year we got half a ton We also collected h ps off dog roses We used to start school in the morning with the hymn "New Every Morning" and finish with "Now the Day Is Over" don't think we ever heard any other hymns. Mr Johnstone was very strict and very good at using the cane of birch And he was very much for king and country During the first world war we had only to say that we could hear a

These pictures were taken in the late 1950s at St Martin's School The poodle was one of two belonging to the then headmistress Miss Maltby Wherever Miss Maltby went, so did the poodles

St Martin's School, writes Vi Thomas, began n 1859 on the site of the present Welsh C ub when there were 35 ch ldren n the upper schoo, 42 nfants and a Mrs Dixon as headmistress

n 1937 the foundation stone for a new school build ng was laid n Ross Road n July 1939 there were 226 ch Idren on the rol and Miss Fanny Brook was headteacher That September with war threaten ng, 119 ch Idren were evacuated from Birm ngham to the school, complete with their teachers and were a bi leted n the district.
